Covid 19 Safety Measures

Privateer Yacht Club intends to follow the guidance of the Hamilton County Health Department in terms of dealing with the spread of the Covid 19 virus. Guidelines established below are derived from the current Directive No. 5, issued on January 16, 2021, and in effect through March 31st, 2021. These guidelines will be amended as the County updates their plan.

General Guidelines for members

Members and guests are welcome to use all club facilities but are encouraged to practice the recommended steps prescribed by Hamilton County.

- a. When outdoors, keep at least 6 feet between you and another person not in your immediate family and wear your mask when you must be closer than 6'.
- b. When indoors, masks must be worn unless you are seated for dining.

Basic Guidelines for Clubhouse Use

- 1) Masks must be worn inside the clubhouse unless you are seated at a table.
- 2) Food should not be served buffet style. It is recommended that food be served in individual covered containers when possible, or by plate when ready to be picked up. (avoid standing in line)
- 3) Beverages should be served in individual cans or bottles.

Occupancy Limits

- 1) Occupancy of the overall clubhouse with the overhead doors closed should be limited to 30 people.
- 2) Occupancy of the overall clubhouse with overhead doors open should be limited to 50 persons.
- 3) Kitchen occupancy should be limited to 4 persons.
- 4) Lounge Occupancy should be limited to 8 persons.
- 5) Harvey Howalt Regatta Room should be limited to 2 persons.

Event Planning

The club recommends that members planning a social event, private function or regatta dinner take the following steps.

- a) Notify potential attendees that PYC has established the above set of guidelines, and members and visitors to the club are asked to follow them.
- b) PYC recommends that prior to the event, hosts use disinfectant solution to wipe down any surfaces that attendees may come in contact with, including but not limited to; door handles, kitchen appliances, plumbing fixtures, tables and chair backs.
- c) It is recommended that those in charge of events use a hand-held temperature sensor to scan attendees as they arrive within the clubhouse.
